Labour's Policies and Pledges

Now that the Election is over and done with, we should look over the policies and pledges of the Labour Party so we know what to expect from the new government going forward. Amongst them include the following:

- Cutting the NHS waiting times down by paying staff to work weekends and evenings.
- Training more GPs, recruiting more mental health nurses and expanding the NHS' workforce.
- Turn the minimum wage into a livable wage that takes into account the cost of living, and scrap age bands for adults.
- Reform employment support including by bringing Job Center Plus and the National Careers Service together to help get people into work.
- Expand childcare by opening up 3000 primary school-based nurseries, as well as free breakfast clubs for every school in England.
- Recruit 6500 teachers by ending tax breaks for private schools, as well as employing more mental health support staff and career advisers.
- Upgrade the National Grid and reform planning to speed up clean energy projects.
- Make sure local communities benefit from hosting clean energy infrastructure.

- Let local authorities take control of bus networks and remove the ban on publicly owned bus networks.
- Fix an extra million potholes in England every year and take action to reduce the cost of car insurance.
- Put 13,000 neighbourhood police and community support officers on the beat in England and Wales.
- Tackle antisocial behavior with new Respect Orders, giving the police the power to ban adult offenders from town centers.
- Seek a new UK-EU security pact and improve trading with the bloc, while staying outside the customs union and single market and not reintroducing freedom of movement.
- Improve service accommodation and establish an armed forces commissioner to improve service life.
- Ban so called no-fault evictions and empower renters to challenge rent rises.
- Build a new generation of towns, fast track the approval of brownfield sites and release some "low quality" green belt for housing
- Create a new independent Ethics and Integrity Commission to so government ministers are held to the highest standards.
- Devolve more powers over transport, skills, employment support, housing and planning to local councils and mayors.
